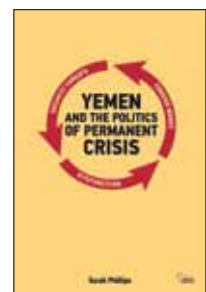
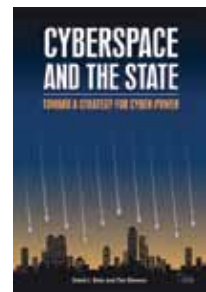
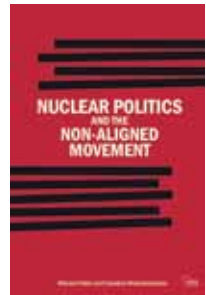
Yemen and the Politics of Permanent Crisis – Sarah Phillips

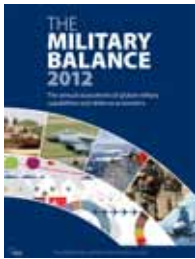

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The Military Balance

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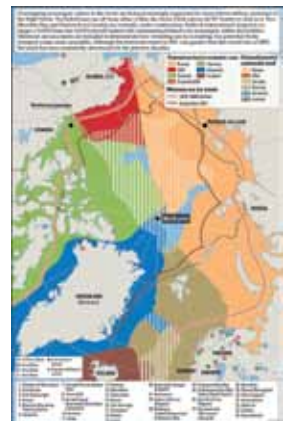
The Military Balance is the International Institute for Strategic Studies' annual assessment of the military capabilities and defence economics of 171 countries worldwide. It is an essential resource for those involved in security policymaking, analysis and research.

As well as detailed information on inventories, the book contains region-by-region analysis of major military and economic trends affecting security policy and the trade in military equipment.

The Military Balance 2012 contains region-by-region analysis of the major military and economic developments affecting defence and security policies and the trade in weapons and other military equipment. Comprehensive tables detail major military training activities, UN and non-UN deployments, and give data on key equipment holdings and defence economics, as well as defence-expenditure trends over a ten-year period.



New Features in *The Military Balance 2012*

- The land sections of *The Military Balance* data entries have been revised to improve understanding of the combined-arms capabilities of modern land forces. *The Military Balance 2012* carries extra detail on armies' combat support and combat service support capabilities
- For states in North America, Europe, Asia, the Middle East, North Africa and Russia – the IISS this year includes brief summaries of nations' military capabilities, which help to inform readers' understanding of the organisation and inventory data contained within the country entries
- The 2012 book contains a series of essays at the start of the book on 'Arab Militaries and the Arab Awakening', including a study of the war in Libya; 'Trends in Combat and Capability since 9/11', and 'The War in Afghanistan'
- As well as regional policy and defence economics essays, *The Military Balance 2012* analyses in greater detail policy and defence economics questions for the following ten – top defence budgeting – states: US, UK, France, Germany, China, Russia, Saudi Arabia, Japan, India, Brazil
- More in-depth tables and graphics than previous editions relating to aspects of national and global defence economics

- Maps of the war in Libya; the war in Afghanistan; conflict in Côte d'Ivoire; the military response to the Japanese earthquake/tsunami; and security issues in the Arctic
- Integration of brief assessments of states' cyber capacities into the national data sections
- Table of selected non-state groups
- The 2012 Chart of Conflict has been updated and has an 'Arab Awakening' theme

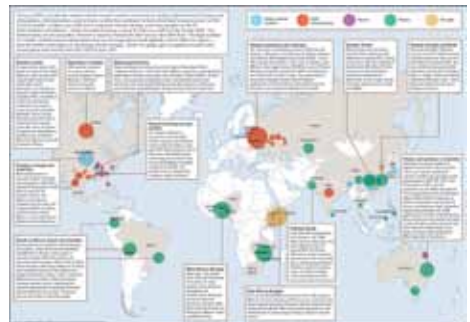
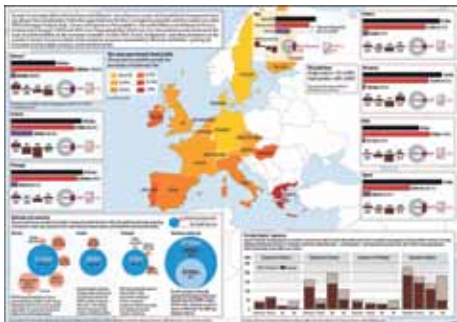
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In the year 2010 to mid-2011, the pace of history quickened. *Strategic Survey 2011: The Annual Review of World Affairs* includes a special chapter on the Arab Awakening, in which protests against autocratic rule spread like wildfire across the Arab world, toppling the leaders of Tunisia and Egypt and bringing conflict elsewhere. An earthquake and tsunami killed thousands in Japan, and triggered the worst nuclear accident for 25 years. As war dragged on in Afghanistan, Western leaders agreed on a plan to withdraw from combat. A daring raid into Pakistan by American special forces killed al-Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden but caused fury in Islamabad. Meanwhile, the high level of food prices caused mounting concern, as did the provocative military actions of the North Korean regime. China's economy, military power and global influence continued to expand.

Strategic Survey 2011: The Annual Review of World Affairs includes a chronology of the year's events, essays on important policy issues, and a Strategic Geography section providing vital data on key issues – such as extreme weather and European sovereign debt – in map form. The book also includes region-by-region chapters analysing all the year's strategic developments.

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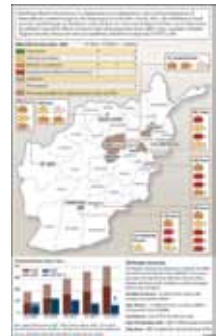
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Survival: Global Politics and Strategy

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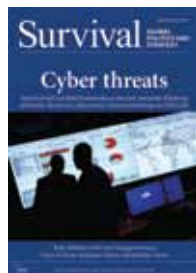
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Armed Conflict Database

In order to provide up-to-date and objective information on conflict-related matters from around the world, the IISS has developed the *Armed Conflict Database (ACD)*. Compiled by the IISS Transnational Threats and Political Risk Programme, the *ACD* provides an interactive and user-friendly source of information on over 75 armed conflicts. Born out of the IISS Chart of Conflict (see p. 4), the database covers international and internal armed conflicts, as well as terrorism. It offers year-on-year analysis of conflicts, their political status, number of fatalities and weapons being used. It also covers current events, conflict backgrounds and timelines.

Reference Reviews



Each conflict is analysed in detail under the following headings:

- **Political trends:** analyses the latest developments in the conflict including its type, ongoing negotiations and peace processes.
- **Human Security:** maintains a check on the human cost of the conflict. This feature informs the user of both the total number of fatalities in the conflict, and the number of fatalities in a specific year, as well as information about refugees and Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs).
- **Military & Security:** offers an overview on the general military balance between the combatants, as well as annual military developments including arms acquisitions and military information pertaining to the conflict.
- **Latest timelines:** presents a constantly updated timeline relating to the conflict. When accessed, the user is automatically transferred to the current date, but by scrolling the user can quickly gain an insight into recent and historic incidents and developments. When searching for specific information the user can either browse through the different year-on-year reports and fact sheets online or generate reports.
- **Annual Update:** offers a summary of the main events during the year. A fact box succinctly covers the type of conflict, its parties, current status, the number of fatalities and the weapons used. With the fact box comes a brief update of the year's trends and incidents relating to all features of the conflict.
- **Historical Background:** provides a historical background paper to the conflict, placing recent developments into perspective by explaining the underlying causes and tension behind the fighting.

The *ACD* has a built-in function to generate targeted reports on conflict data back to 1997 and can correlate reports from various years, conflicts, regions and topics. Variables can be isolated or combined and the results are easily presented, either on-screen in a table or as a downloadable document in CSV or Excel format. Timelines are updated weekly, reports bi-monthly or quarterly, and the annual analysis is published each February.

North Korean Security Challenges: A net assessment

A detailed and objective assessment of North Korea's nuclear, chemical, biological and missile programmes. The dossier is broad in scope, addressing North Korea's conventional forces; internal dynamics amidst an unfolding dynastic succession; non-military security threats, including state criminality, human rights abuses and refugee issues; and unification scenarios for the peninsula.

The FARC Files: Venezuela, Ecuador and the Secret Archive of 'Raúl Reyes'

Unique insights into the thinking and evolution of the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC). It is based on a study of the computer disks belonging to Luis Edgar Devía Silva (aka Raúl Reyes), head of FARC's International Committee (COMINTER), that were seized by Colombian armed forces in a raid in March 2008.

Iran's Nuclear, Chemical and Biological Capabilities: A net assessment

Provides a detailed and objective technical assessment of these programmes and offers a carefully nuanced estimate for how long it would take Iran to produce nuclear weapons under different scenarios.

Iran's Ballistic Missile Capabilities: A net assessment

Offers the most detailed information available in the public domain about Iran's liquid- and solid-fuelled missiles and its indigenous production capabilities. The dossier also analyses the military and strategic effectiveness of Iran's potential arsenal, including both conventional and non-conventional warheads.
